### Vignette 1

Roommate B is from a small town, four hours away. Roommate B enjoys hiking, camping and going on long runs, and is a vegan. Roommate B studies mainly at the library. When in your room, Roommate B will be very social and keep your dorm room door open to everyone on your floor.

Roommate C is a 19-year-old Spanish major. Roommate C is from out of state. Roommate C likes being active, hanging out with friends, and practicing the guitar in your room. Roommate C is a morning person, going to sleep around 9:30 p.m. and waking up around 6:00 a.m. every day. Roommate C will use those early mornings to study. Roommate C is personable and loves to talk but can also be a bit intense.

Roommate D is an 18-year-old psychology major. Roommate D is from the largest city in the state. Roommate D likes to draw, play tennis, and listen to loud music. Roommate D always studies with music playing through their headphones. Roommate D is a night owl and, as an only child, has never shared a room before.

You are a second-grade teacher at the local elementary school. Your class is full to capacity, but the principal needs to place one more child in your class. Based on the following descriptions, select your first, second, third, and fourth choice for the child you would like to join your class.

Child B is an outgoing child who has several friends in your classroom already. Child B has a very big imagination and will frequently ask to play make believe. Child B loves cartoon characters.

Child C has one younger brother. Child C's favorite subject is math. Child C is creative and enjoys making new friends. Child C tries hard at school but really struggles with reading. Child C's favorite color is blue.

Child D is the middle child in the family, with one older sister and one younger brother. Social Studies is Child D's favorite subject. Child D is well liked by other children because Child D is kind. Child D will need frequent reminders to complete their work on time. Child D is learning to play the piano.

At the large firm at which you work, you've been tasked with launching and completing an important project. The project's success could mean a big pay raise for you. You've been told to select a Co-worker from the pool of colleagues at your firm to work on this important project with you. Based on the following descriptions, select your first, second, third, and fourth choice for the Co-worker you would like to work with on this important project.

Co-worker A has been with the firm for 5 years. Co-worker A is very good at time management. Co-worker A has a strong personality but can be a bit bossy. Although Co-worker A delegates tasks well, Co-worker A sometimes takes a lighter workload.

Co-worker B has just recently starting working at the firm but came from one of the competitor firms. Co-worker B gives excellent presentations. Although Co-worker B tends to brown-nose you, you've heard that Co-Worker B will often gossip and twist the dialogue. Co-worker B is ambitious, but they're known as a hard worker.

Co-worker C has been at the firm for 3 years and has a disability. [Material Set 1]

Co-worker D has been with the firm for 7 years. Co-worker D has good interpersonal communication and networking skills. Co-worker D is strongly opinionated, and sometimes their comments are productive. Co-worker D's work tends to fall in the middle of the pack; it is neither spectacular nor horrible.

You're a college student who has decided to go on an alternative spring break in the Appalachian Mountain region, focusing on environmental restoration, protection, and maintenance. You've never met any of the other students who are also going on the trip, but you need to choose one other person with whom you will be paired throughout the entire week, including sharing a cabin and working side-by-side on the project. Based on the following descriptions, select your first, second, third and fourth choice for the student you would like to be paired with.

Student A is studying business. Student A plays on the club soccer team and is also deeply involved in Greek life (sororities and fraternities). Student A is super friendly, outgoing, and is very resourceful at problem solving. Student A decided to go on the trip because they needed volunteer services to pad their resume. Student A has already started to complain a little about the primitive accommodations but can bring along a lot of expensive gear to share with you.

Student B is studying biology and is a pre-med student. Student B is strongly interested in wildlife conservation. As president of the Conservation Club on campus, their interest in conservation was the sole motivator for their joining the trip. Student B is very practical, but not long in patience, and can easily become terse and snappish. Student B is a strong leader, but tends to dominate every group they're in.

Student C is studying psychology. [Material Sets 1, 2, and 3]

Student D is studying history and journalism. Student D is a member of the campus outdoor activity club as an avid skier and snowboarder. Student D joined the trip only because they wanted to leave campus for spring break and couldn't afford to go to Colorado with their friends. Student D is adventurous and excited about the project. Student D is high-energy but doesn't have a super long attention span, which might make them go off task occasionally.

You are the coach of your community's junior basketball team. The team is open to 9- to 11-year olds and is limited to 12 players. Practices are held every Tuesday and Thursday after school, and the team often travels to meets across town on Saturdays. You need to choose one more player for your roster. Based on the following descriptions, select your first, second, third and fourth choice for the player you would like to have on the team.

Based on the following descriptions, select your first, second, third and fourth choice for the person you would like to be paired with.
